Did You Know?

We will try and have a little history of our "Little Church That Cares" in each newsletter. The information that we present has been gathered from original records found in the Church by Rose Graham and Dave Potter. These records also are a treasure trove of genealogy information with marriages and baptisms going back to the early 1800's.

As our town grew in the early 1800's so did the need for places to gather and worship. As with most frontier areas, families would gather in homes or the small school houses each Sunday in what was often called "Classes". When available, circuit preachers would deliver the message but often this would fall on a local deacon who could read.

Often these gatherings would result in standing room only. On one of these occasions someone who was weary of standing dropped down upon John Beadle's lap, much to his annoyance. On the following day, as Deacon Stowell was working in his shop, Mr. Beadle entered saying "Good morning, Deacon I have important business on hand today." "Ah, what now" says the Deacon.

"We are going to have a new meeting house where everyone can have a seat of his own. I ain't going to meeting any more to be sot on!" "Such a house as we want to build will cost \$2,000. I know the circumstances of everyman in this town, and just how much he is able to give. I have made out a list of ten men who can give \$100, ten who can give \$50, ten who can give \$10 and ten who can give \$5. Now," he said with a forcible gesture, "every man has to pay the sum opposite his name or I'll abuse him."



Now the right place to begin is in the Church so I came to you first. I can pay \$200 and not hurt any, and anyhow, I won't be out of pocket much, for my farm will be worth more. Besides it will give an air of respectability to the town. Now you can't really afford to give more than \$100, but considering your

interest in such manners and your position in the Church, I knew you would give an extra \$50 if necessary. That will just make out the sum."

The Deacon heartily assented to the plan, as it had long laid near his heart. Other people were seen and the money was pledged to the Orwell Meeting House Society for the purpose of building a Church.

The result was our wonderful Orwell Union Church which was constructed on land purchased from O.B. Olmstead for \$40. The cost of the construction was \$1,963, a close approximation to what estimated by Mr. Beadle. The construction began in 1844 and the Church was dedicated in 1845.



Our Noisy Can Mission
